You can view online lots of fantastic isolation art from students and tutors - and do please send us your own to share with our wonderful PSAD community. Lots of ideas here too!





SCHOOL NEWS

I hope you are keeping well and safe in these unprecedented and uncertain times.

In February when I wrote the contents for the School News, who knew that the circumstances would change significantly for us all in a short period of time. Following the government guidelines, regretfully the School did close from 5pm on Thursday 19th March. Since the closure, our priority was to safeguard and support the staff teams but also to ensure any student concerns were managed.

With the daily government announcements, we endeavoured to work through the information and decide how best the School can operate in the summer term and the consequent months. With limited staff teams remaining after the Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme, and working remotely, we knew this would be a huge challenge.

As mentioned in previous updates, for continuity and motivation for staff and students as well as to support the sustainability of the School, we focussed on developing a completely new curriculum for the summer term, starting with 'taster' sessions for our online courses from 4th May 2020.

We launched the online taster art classes via Zoom with a limited number of tutors. After a slow start, the majority of the courses eventually had good enrolment numbers and one class even reached the maximum capacity set. The final tally for the four days was 90 students, who participated in the classes.

The online courses proved to be very popular, with fantastic feedback from the students albeit the odd hiccup with technology and late enrolments. team at PSAD are hoping to build on this and have already developed short two/three week courses starting from 11th May. We hope that eventually the online provision will compliment and support the classes the School premises. on broadening the curriculum offer to a wider community.

I have included a few of the student comments below and a link to the webpage showing the work achieved from the classes this week.


For the last few weeks, I have been working on our recovery plan and strategy, which will of course need be a phased approach. Going forward, we will need to develop a whole new curriculum for the School, certainly for the foreseeable future, which is a hybrid of online and site-based options.

We hope that through a serious of measures, we can start to consider ways of opening the School whilst the safety of staff and students will remain our key priorities. I would like to reinforce that our students and community are at the heart of all that we do, and we will do everything we can to provide that crucial role and serve our students.

Your continued support in our wonderful School is hugely appreciated as always. We look forward to seeing you soon at the School when it is safe and feasible. Please take care to stay safe and for now best wishes on behalf of the PSAD teams.

The School and ENABLE are committed to retaining staff and fortunately almost all were able to be furloughed with their jobs secured. A remaining skeleton staff, consisting of Head of School Nilar Morgan, Harsha Patel, and Belinda Bates, are working from home to keep the School going. Thanks to their efforts our precious community is still intact!

CHAIR'S MESSAGE (continued)

The most obvious question is, will the School be able to reopen in September? With 50% of students over 60 and only one member of staff under 40, it is quite an acute problem - made not much clearer by our Prime Minister even on Monday night! Nilar and others are trying to second guess what will happen and are beginning to come up with ideas, assuming a slow unwinding of lockdown.

- It's possible to envisage hybrid classes for drawing and painting and even to some extent printmaking. Maybe having studio access for fewer, socially distanced, students alternating one week on/one week off, with online tutorials in the off-weeks for those able to go out.
- Online tutorials only for the most vulnerable still working at home.
- Pottery is the most difficult and issues like personal clay and tools, working at home, transporting unfired work to be fired at that School etc. all having to be factored in.
- Certainly for the September term, all those already booked on will be assured of a place on whatever shape of course is running. but this will involve whole new management and organisational structures.
- A lot of work is needed in a short time.
- Maybe we have to run courses which can be attended in person and via 'e' links at the same time??? Lights, cameras, action in every studio!!

Anyone who has got stuck into Zoom, Skype, WhatsApp, etc. during the lockdown knows that you need better equipment than our phones and iPads to really make video teaching and conferencing work on a big scale. The School will need equipment, expertise and materials to get this up and running. We need to start a major fundraising exercise to help the School get ready.

- We will be seeking donations to a special fund to help the School with equipment and development of online courses. Information will be sent out shortly to all Friends directly and also to all students and others interested in helping the School, using our new social media presence.
- We will be looking for new commercial sponsors, so if any of you have ideas or contacts please drop me an e-mail **wayland.clare@gmail.com**

Lastly and most importantly the Friends committee is looking to hold a major **Celebration Party and Art Auction** to raise funds and signal the re-opening of the School. date to be announced. Some of you will remember the 'Raise the Roof 'auction which was a huge success. This time we want student involvement to form a central strand to the auction. We visualize this project as being something that students could engage with during lockdown and that it would culminate in a "live" auction and party to celebrate the reopening of the school

Expect an invitation soon to develop work in your chosen medium around a theme (to be announced). Develop your ideas and make work to be donated for the Auction to help rejuvenate the school! Our School building may be closed but long live the School!!!!!

TREASURERS REPORT

Our financial situation remains strong with £5000 in our current account and £20,700 on deposit. Obviously it is desirable to hold on to these funds in the present circumstances and to wait to see what needs may arise for funds when the School reopens. The March workshops made a small surplus after costs, which is reinvested in the Friends activities to support the School.





CLASS REPRESENTATIVES

Sadly it's still the case that far too many classes don't have a class rep and I have ranted about that frequently in this newsletter. How many times have you read me say how easy it is to be a rep and that there is really very little work involved?

Well if you have doubted the usefulness and importance of class reps and are missing the School now during this period of lockdown perhaps these examples of what they can help do will change your mind.

Many classes are now meeting online each week to share sessions of artistic activity. Whether it is full scale video meetings via systems like Zoom or just using something like WhatsApp to send pictures of what is being done and general bits of feedback and encouragement. I am also aware of an experimental media class and a pottery group that have regular Zoom meetings to discuss projects and progress.

So if you are missing PSAD and if your class doesn't have a rep and you haven't had any contact with your fellow students have a think about it. If you need any help setting up a WhatsApp, Skype, Zoom group (or any other) I may be able to help.

OK, so the tutors are not teaching and it's not the real thing but it is better than nothing and can be fun. My Wednesday morning drawing class has a 2-3 hour session once (sometimes twice) a week using WhatsApp to help continue to develop our skills. Information on digital activities, online exhibitions and tutorials (and the odd joke) is shared and has proved to be very useful.

FRIENDS EVENTS: SPRING WORKSHOPS

THE BARON'S DYNAMIC LIFE DRAWING - with Chris Gilvan-Cartwright



What life drawing workshop starts with a trombone tune from the tutor? Why, "Dynamic Life Drawing" with The Baron, of course! The Baron (Chris XXXX) introduced the workshop by saying that the trombone blasts were to "clear the air" and get rid of any history and influences lurking in the studio. He urged us to feel our empathy with the figure (we've all got a body!) and not to overthink our drawings; to capture the sense and essence of the poses rather than try and be representational. And to help he played CDs all day, saying the music would engage our rational minds and free up our drawing.



Then we were off! We drew rapidly: 2-3 minute poses drawn on top of each other; then with our non-dominant hand; then in continuous line; then not looking at the paper; then from memory. Model Frankie, in fantastic make-up and headgear, wearing only a neck ruff, moved rapidly, in dynamic and elegant positions. We quickly concertina-ed our paper and Frankie reappeared wearing Dadaist accessories: a Minotaur paper mask; one black glove; a paper fan as a skirt; one breast decorated with a paper spiral ... She moved and turned and bent and stretched along a studio "catwalk" in 25-30 very short poses as we quickly drew and drew along our concertina "book", trying to capture "the sense and essence of the poses".



Then it was all change again! We spread out and taped long sheets of paper to the floor and drew in ink, with the brush on the end of a long bamboo pole. This was challenging as well as messy: very difficult to get the proportions in any way right from that angle. Finally a more traditional and slightly longer pose using colour (pastels or inks) with Frankie in a colourful outfit to inspire us. I found this longer, seated, pose the dullest to draw, which showed me the value of the rest of this inspiring day.

It was a very dynamic day indeed and model Frankie (who often works with Chris) was wonderful: she really energised us with her fantastic make-up, outfits and poses. I'd love to do it again: there can be no higher praise.

BOOKBINDING: A MULTI-SECTION HARDCOVER BOOK - with Alexandra Czinczel

This was the first time I had ever attempted bookbinding so I was a total novice as were most of the other students.

We were taught how to fold and sew the paper pages and then to put together the spine, end papers and the hard cover.

We had a wonderful teacher who led us through with demonstrations at each stage helping us individually as well.

At the end of the day we had all completed a beautiful A5 book. It was a hugely enjoyable and satisfying day - I would highly recommend it.

HANDBUILDING WITH PORCELAIN - with Jessica Thorn

Porcelain speaks to the young and the brave, so given that neither of these adjectives describes me, it was with much trepidation that I signed up for Jessica Thorn's porcelain workshop.



Jessica's work is simplicity personified. Handbuilt in the round, her work is deeply reminiscent of a bygone age when artists crafted their work to accomplish a perfect marriage between beauty and function.

Of course behind an effortless façade lies a lot of thought and hard work, which Jessica very generously then set about revealing through a comprehensive and dynamic demonstration.

The proper preparation of the clay is vital. Jessica showed us how to wedge the clay using clean canvas cloths and then how to roll out the clay using 3mm guide rods (wooden paint stirrers).

It was explained that it is essential to start rolling out the clay once you have got it into the basic shape you want to work from, by working from the middle of the clay outwards.

It is important to lift the edges of the flattening clay off the canvas so that it does not stick to the cloth. This ensures that you get it to the desired thickness with a minimum of effort. 3mm is the optimum for handbuilding porcelain work as it is less likely to crack whilst retaining its strength.

In order to make sure that the clay has no memory of its former shape you then use a rubber kidney to compress the surface using gentle strokes on both sides. At this time you can then add tiny pieces of coloured clay to the surface of the porcelain to add areas of colour. Then you cut out all of the parts needed to construct your piece. This ensures they dry at the same rate. Jessica had prepared a whole series of templates that she uses to create the component parts; sides, bases and handles etc. All of the templates had been calculated to provide the perfect angles and dimensions so her pieces could be seamlessly reconstructed by us all in the allotted time. We were also encouraged to create work by curling the clay around cylinder tubing or by using press moulds.

When the clay is pre-leather hard, this is when you can use stamps, imprint or sgraffito to add surface design or texture to your work. The perfect moment to use the stamps and to form shapes takes judgement. The clay needs to have lost its stickiness, but have enough flexibility not to crack when it is bent and have enough strength and rigidity to remain in a set position.

When dry enough, and once the desired position of each part has been scored onto the clay, each piece of the construction is then joined together using porcelain slip/slurry. Jessica uses coloured slips to highlight each and every seam or join in her construction. Sometimes without the colour slip Jessica's joins would be almost invisible and sometimes her joins are overlapped so that they contribute to the piece's form. But regardless of which method she uses the actual construction of the piece is emphasised by tiny coloured lines reminiscent of a dressmaker's sewing pattern.



Jessica explains that one should use a lot of slurry to fit the pieces together because any spillage or excess can be cleaned up using a barely damp sponge or tool when the work is a bit drier. At this later stage it is also possible to use coloured clays to create inlays by incising into the surface and infilling the space with coloured clay. Again the inlay can be tidied up when the work is at a drier leather-hard stage by sponging off the extra surface coloured clay.

Once any necessary refinements have been made to the lip and foot of the work, it should be left to dry slowly in readiness for biscuit firing. Although Jessica glazes the inside of her work so that they can be used in a functional way, she never glazes the outside of her work. Instead she polishes the exteriors using a wet and dry technique that heightens the coloured slip and gives the surface a translucent appearance.

Throughout the day Jessica helped each of us to make pieces which either resembled her work or which were constructed and decorated using her building techniques. All of us, irrespective of our competence, thoroughly enjoyed the day and learned so much.

Jessica has intimated that she would be happy to come back to run another workshop, so if you can get a place on the next one you will be a very lucky person. 

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT PSAD DURING LOCKDOWN

NB: These are based on the School's FAQs but have been summarised by the Friends to address the most common points.

Is the School open at all?

No, the School is fully closed, operating with a skeleton staff working from home.

How will I get further updates on the School?

The front page of the PSAD section of the website is updated as matters develop. https://enablelc.org/psad/about/

The School Administrator, Harsha Patel is also emailing each update to all the student groups by individual class.

Can I enrol on the new online 'taster' courses now?

Yes, enrolment opened on 20th April.

Will the School offer online classes for the summer term?

Yes. The online courses for the summer term will be a whole new programme. Students who are interested can enrol separately on the shorter online courses.

Can I transfer my existing course enrolment to a new online course?

No, these are separate, new courses. It is too complex to arrange transfers/partial fee refunds for 100s students with only a skeleton staff. The online course fees for the summer term will be adjusted as this is a different offer.

Will my enrolment for a summer term course be automatically transferred to the same course running in September instead?

Yes, this has already been done. Current enrolments on a summer term course guarantees a place for the Autumn term, so no need for priority booking if transferring. The fees for those deferring to the Autumn term will remain at the 2019-2020 rate, rather than the slightly increased fee for each new academic year.

Can I get a refund of my enrolment fees if I am unable to attend the class in the Autumn term (i.e. September)?

Yes, you have the option to have a refund of the summer term enrolment if you can't/don't want to defer it to the Autumn term. If you want a refund you will need to contact the School. E-mail is best.

But please note: With limited staff and access to the School restricted, refunds cannot be processed immediately. Refund requests will be processed when staff can properly access the facilities. Processing may take some time so please be patient. The window for refund requests for existing enrolments will stay open to ensure that all students have a choice in making the appropriate decisions as the situation evolves in the next few months.

Are staff jobs being retained, are they furloughed, and what help is available to them?

As the School premises remain closed until further notice, there are only two full-time staff working, the School Administrator and the Head of School, with the Curriculum Manager on reduced hours operating remotely to support the development of online provision. Nearly all other staff, including part-time teachers and models, are eligible for the Government Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme and are furloughed.

Currently five tutors are helping to develop the online courses; as the online programme expands, individual staff can return to the School and come out of the scheme. Until such time, all furloughed staff must adhere to HMRC guidelines to safeguard their eligibility for the scheme and cannot do any work for the School.
