SCHOOL NEWS

A very warm welcome back to all our existing students and to our new students.

Since the start of term in September, it has been great to see you all around the School and to hear feedback on how delighted you were to be back.

With the closure of the School since 19th March, we all faced several months of uncertainties and for most very challenging times. In planning for re-opening of the School, ensuring the safety of students and staff teams were paramount.

We put in place a series of measures and mentioned the need for everyone to take collective responsibility to keep to the new arrangements.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone in complying to the new protocols and in contributing towards keeping each other safe. With reference to the recent government announcement on Saturday 31st October, we did consider all options carefully but felt the School should remain open in order to continue to provide the service to all our students and staff teams during these difficult times.

We do understand that some of you may choose to self-isolate based on the new government guidelines and, where possible, the staff teams will endeavour to find remote learning options to keep everyone engaged.

We will continue to monitor and adapt the service as necessary in discussion with the tutors, who have so far been fantastic in developing creative, flexible solutions to their delivery.

We are really pleased with our current enrolment for the autumn term. Despite the new reduced class sizes, we have over 1000 enrolments which includes several online courses for students unable to access the onsite provision.

STAFF NEWS

Sadly, a few members staff are no longer working at the School including Liz Elmhirst, who has decided to retire and Ed Adlington, who as you know emigrated to the US.

We welcome Tom Pennick, Print Tutor/ & Technician, Catherine Greenwood, Print, Drawing, and Painting Tutor, and Jorge Pumisacho - our regular cleaner but he is now employed directly by Enable Leisure and Culture.

OTHER NEWS

Fundraising and Grants:

In addition to the wonderful work of the Friends group in raising funds for the School, in collaboration with the Head of Fundraising at Enable Leisure & Culture, we were able to submit several applications for funding during lockdown, which were successful. One of the grants allowed us to purchase the required technology for our hybrid/online classes, and we are also just about to start working on a joint project at the Pump House Gallery with the Events team at Enable Leisure & Culture. I will provide further updates on this in the new year

TREASURER'S REPORT

The Friends' financial year end was 8th September. At that point our balances stood at c.£5.9K on our current account and c.£21K on deposit. This is a much larger balance than usual which reflects our successful fundraising efforts before lockdown.

Membership grew and the 2019 Christmas Fair was our most successful yet. In the second part of the year, everything obviously went on hold and we were not able to progress the projects we would normally have funded for the School and the members.

We had held back spending last year so funds were available to support any changes in the management of the School, but Wandsworth Council have still not responded to our proposals and, in the current situation, it is not clear when this will be resolved.

Please do not think that because we currently have funds in the bank, we and the School do not need your support.

We are looking to support several projects, including improved lighting on the back stairs, replacement of the gas kiln, work in the print studio, and enhanced opportunities for online learning.

Funds from the Friends are crucial because they enable Nilar and her team to provide the matched funding that is needed in order to bid for the funding support that they have been so successful at gaining.



We are also developing a website which will allow us to communicate with members much more effectively. We are planning new activities and events, including something for Christmas.

The accounts will be presented at the AGM which will be held via Zoom this year, on 12th December at 6.00pm. Please do join us. But most important of all, please do show your support for the School by renewing your membership and remembering to gift aid if you are eligible.

Friends Membership Renewal 2020/2021

If you have been at the School this term you will have noticed that there has been no Friends Membership renewal/sign up desk. The reason for that is pretty obvious, however, despite our absence and the lack of usual activities I can assure you the Friends have been busy supporting PSAD in various ways and we are also looking at the possibility of having a Christmas exhibition at the end of term to give students the opportunity to showcase and sell work, and for us to raise a bit of much needed money for the School.

So on the subject of money we would like to ask you to renew your Friends membership for 2020/2021. New Tutor and Print Technician

Thomas Pennick is a London based artist who specialises in printmaking and sculpture. He araduated from City and Guilds of London Art School in 2018. where he discovered an obsession with traditional Tom's practice art making processes. engages with Printmaking, Metal work, Life Drawing and Modelling, Photography, and Historical Stone Carving.

Tom's etching and print work follows a theme of nature, heavily influenced by photographs and sketches created during his time spent in Africa and by exposure to conservation organisations that he worked with there.

Conservation is key to the survival of many species of plants and animals across the world. Tom's etchings aim to address the many environmental problems and threats that he experienced in Africa, at home in England, and globally, as well as attempting to capture our planet's natural beauty.

One class member put it very well when she said that our WhatsApp had been a great way to share our creativity and to encourage each other. ONLINE COURSE: COMIC ILLUSTRATION

with Jane Porter, Thursdays 10am-12pm

The online courses are proving to be a fantastic and flexible alternative to the class work. This term I was abroad for a while therefore an online course had been a practical arrangement. The 10 week online Comic Illustration course with Jane Porter airs on Thursdays 10am-12pm.

The course started on the 24th September 2020 when we were briefed on the term plan and introduced to the software. The class is held via Zoom, which works really well considering students are all in different places.

We sketch, draw, share and review the work with guidance of the fantastically inspiring and encouraging teacher Jane Porter.

Before each class we are given (sent) the handout outlining the brief and examples for that week's task. At the start of the class we catch up, get briefed than get to work until break time around 11am when sketches are shared and comments posted.



The sketches are sent to the tutor who then compiles and displays them on the screen one by one accompanied by the constructive feedback. The continuous stream of students' comments in the chat-box gives an additional layer of peers' feedback.

Jane has also introduced the Padlet, an online platform with a private space to share work. The work continues until 11.45am with an end of class review and a chat, setting out the following week's task.

ONLINE COURSE: COMIC ILLUSTRATION

The Comic Illustration course makes you look around more inquisitively, notice everyday events in a different way whilst practicing hand drawing. The class feels very hands-on with individual work and team culture interweaved.

The online courses are taught remotely via Zoom by PSAD tutors in a range of disciplines. The courses are designed to give students remote access to demonstrations, individual and group feedback, through set projects or tasks and an opportunity to discuss your work with advice from the tutor on how to improve and develop your skills.

ESTATE ART ROEHAMPTON PROJECT

Background

The Alton estate is in one of the 10% most deprived areas in the UK with respect to income and housing. As a long-term resident and carer, I have seen firsthand the isolation felt by residents and the impact the lack of support and facilities has for young people, putting many at risk of violence and gangrelated crime. During these difficult and uncertain times, when people are at home and isolated, it is more important than ever to find ways to support this community.



- Estate Art believes that art in its many forms has the ability to shift your focus and offers
 a positive way to express emotions that are hard to communicate in words.
- Estate Art last year curated an exhibition at the Kings Head pub in Roehampton over two weekends in October bringing together eight local up-and-coming artists and giving them the opportunity to display their work free of financial and other constraints.
- Estate Art has contacted different venues in and around Roehampton and is at present talking to the Green Man on Putney heath about holding an exhibition there in the near future with approximately eleven artists participating.
- Estate Art organized the Roehampton Sing Along. The object was to lift the spirits of residents in and around the area including residents in sheltered housing. A group of singers came to perform and goody bags decorated by local artists were distributed.
- Estate Art is about helping creative individuals in Roehampton, Putney, Wandsworth and Wimbledon side to be open and express themselves freely within the platform of Estate Art. This could be through painting, drawing or by music and performance.

Aims

To facilitate workshops that will be held regularly to include all forms of art, painting, mosaic, pottery and singing, specifically:

- Sing-a-longs music events giving a platform for musicians of all standards within the community.
- Exhibitions to be held in and around Roehampton, Putney, Wandsworth and Wimbledon.
- A safe space for all generations

- You will be able to exhibit **no more than FOUR** works, with nothing larger than A2 (420 x 594mm/16.5 x 23.4 ins) **including the frame.**
- You will need to provide a label suitable to stick to the wall with white tack, or to your picture for display. It must have your name, the title, medium, and price AND a stock number (your initials and a number).
- **WE** will work out a hanging scheme and put nails in the wall and leave a simple label on the nails so you know where you are. Hanging time will be Sunday 29th November, between 10am 4pm.
- IF you really cannot make this time, then consider the times when the potters are coming, but we would like to avoid everyone coming at once for social distancing.
 - You will have to hang your own work on the nails provided.

SHOWCASES – To maintain social distancing:

- We only have 20 spaces. Each space measures approx. 500 x 300 mm. Please e-mail as soon as you can to friendsofpsad@gmail.com to reserve.
- You can fill your space any way you like, one pot or many.
- We will leave a label in your space with your name.
- You will display your own work in the space allocated.
- Display timings between 1-2 pm. and 5.30-7.30 pm on 27th November **or** between 10 am -1.00 pm 28th November.
- You must provide labels that stand up and can be easily seen with your name, medium, title if any and STOCK NUMBER. We cannot endlessly open the showcases.

- Will have to pay by BACs and e-mail <u>friendsofpsad@gmail.com</u>, giving us the artist's name, stock number, and price. We will put lots of signs around to this effect. We will take payment and repay the artist as soon as possible, taking the usual 10% commission for the School.
- Those who wish to donate their sale to the School can rest assured that all the proceeds will be used to support the School. It will be gratefully received.

WALLS:

- Work may be taken by the purchaser as soon as we have been paid.
- Artists can refill their hanging spots with the same careful labelling etc.

SHOWCASES:

- There will be collection days for work (tbc) to be taken back or for purchasers to take it.
- NB: Packaging is not provided.

ALAN THORNHILL OBITUARY

My father, the sculptor Alan Thornhill, who has died aged 98, is best known as the creator of the Putney Sculpture Trail, the largest outdoor collection of work by one artist in London. At the studio he set up in Putney, in 1959, Alan pioneered a radical and improvisatory approach to claywork that involved dispensing with an internal armature and allowing content to emerge from his unconscious.



Abstract pieces of the 1960s developed into large groups of figures. Pacifism, Jungian psychology and world conflicts were themes that emerged organically in his work. Alan also made a large number of portrait heads from life, including of Tom Stoppard, Colin Davis, AS Neill, Basil Bunting and Enoch Powell. Alan taught sculpture at Morley College in Lambeth for 17 years from 1970 and was subsequently a trustee and then teacher at the Frink School of Figurative Sculpture in Staffordshire, founded by Rosemary Barnett.

He was born in London, the son of Stewart Thornhill (who started life as Sigmund Dornberger), a German Jewish importer of china and glass, and his wife, Louisa (nee Warren). Alan grew up in Fittleworth, Sussex, and was educated at Radley college, in Oxfordshire, and Oxford University, where he studied history. He was an officer in the Gloucestershire Regiment during the second world war and aide-de-camp to General Sir Percy Hobart. He took part in the D-day landings and later became a conscientious objector. Having had Reichian therapy in Norway after the war, he decided to work with his hands and enrolled at Camberwell Art School, in south-east London, where he began his lifelong exploration of clay. He married the painter Sheila Denning in 1950 and set up Hawkley Pottery, near Stroud, Gloucestershire, in 1951.

Growing tired of the repetitive nature of pottery, Alan began to make figurative sculptures in clay, exploring the theme of communication. Moving back to London, he set up the studio in Putney, which he maintained until his death. In later life Alan painted prolifically, creating self-portraits, still lifes and landscapes of Gloucestershire and France, together with large bold charcoal drawings. He moved from London to Stroud in 1994 with his partner, Kate Shuckburgh, and in 2012 had a retrospective at Stroud's Museum in the Park.

Alan donated nine bronze pieces to Wandsworth Borough Council which form the permanent Putney Sculpture Trail near the Thames, opened in 2008. The council leader, Ravi Govindia, said that Alan's "creative genius has provided a long-lasting legacy for the people of Putney. His contribution to cultural life in the borough cannot be overestimated."

Alan is survived by three children - myself and Teresa, from his marriage, which ended in divorce in 1970, and Philip, from a relationship with Suzie Bittner - and five grandchildren, Isaac, Bethan, Jake, Maya and Eva.

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
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
